aturday's script for the Greensboro City Championships couldn't have been written any better for the Greensboro

On the day it was announced the Blue Dolphins had raised the most money in the Swim for Cancer fundraiser, a record breaking total of more than \$62,000, GCC added another accomplishment

to its name — a city championship. It was the perfect ending of an emotional season for the team and

its head coach, Chip Johnson. Johnson lost his wife, Anna Lea, to breast cancer in December, and GCC decided to dedicate their season and their total money raised in the annual competition to honor her.

They have supported me through all of what I've been going through since December, and I feel loved," Chip said. "A lot of people have spent a lot of time and effort and energy to make this happen, and I appreciate the commitment they've made to it and everything they've done."



have a long partnership with the national governing body of golf. Twenty-four USGA events have been played in North Carolina, including several men's and women's U.S. Opens. And in the 1970s, there was even talk of moving the USGA here "We tried to attract the

USGA to Greensboro," Bryan Foundation president Jim Melvin said. "We wanted them to move their headquarters here. The ultimate prize will be

for Greensboro to become part of the USGA's "rotation," making us a candidate for events such U.S. Amateurs and, dare we say, U.S. Opens. "We want to build a reputation," Melvin said. "We have

a reputation in this city for holding big tournaments. I want us to hold big golf tournaments. I want us to aspire to hold a U.S. Amateur here. We have the facility and the course and the support from the community to hold these tournaments.'

Bill McCarthy, the Public Links tournament director, said the USGA felt at home here as soon as it stepped onto the course

"This golf course is exactly what we're looking for," he said. "We look at certain things when we consider new courses. We look at the logistics of the facility. Can it handle the players from an operational standpoint? Do we have room for offices? Can they handle hospitality on the site? It was an absolute nobrainer.

"But when conducting a USGA national championship, especially an amateur event, you have to do it just for the mere fact that you want to do it. From the beginning, they took us right in. The people themselves made it easy for

This tournament has a nice feel to it, and its past winners have a familiar ring. Billy Mayfair won this event when it was played at Tanglewood Park in Clemmons in 1986. Ryan Moore, the defending champion of the Wyndham, won it twice. Brandt Snedeker, another former Wyndham champion, won the Publinx

in 2003, and Tim Clark won in 1997 while attending N.C The players include engi-

neers and bartenders, firemen and waiters. George Archer, who won the GGO at Sedgefield in 1967, won the Publinx, and in 1959 an African-American named William A. Wright won this tournament.

They play it over six days in the North Carolina sun, opening with two rounds of stroke play that will pare the field to 64 for a four-day match play event that will end with two players playing 36 holes by themselves on Saturday to determine the winner.

But if everything goes well, the bigger winner will be Greensboro. A city with a long golfing history in a state synonymous with the game is hoping to add its name to the USGA rotation of courses. That probably won't mean a U.S. Open any time soon, but the organization runs 13 national championships each vear.

This one began in 1922. More than 3,000 golfers began sectional qualifying in June, and 156 made it to Greensboro. The popular "Publinx" is at Bryan Park this week
